



Chronic Condition Coding: Autistic Disorder

Autistic Disorder

Autism is a brain disorder that limits a person’s ability to communicate and relate to other people². Also known as autism spectrum disorder (ASD), the term “spectrum” reflects the wide variation in challenges and strengths possessed by each person¹. Some people can navigate their world, some have exceptional abilities and some struggle to speak².

Symptoms of Autism

Signs of ASD tend to appear between two and three years of age and can include repeated motions and/or words, avoiding eye contact or physical touch, delays in learning to talk and getting upset by minor changes². Additionally, some people with autism can experience physical symptoms such as constipation, sleep problems, poor coordination of muscles and seizures². These signs, however, can also occur in children without ASD and at any age^{1,2}. It is important that caregivers talk with a healthcare provider to request a screening for autism.

Treatment of Autism

Treatment for ASD is dependent on screening results. A diagnosis of autism is not needed for people to begin receiving services related to developmental delays or learning challenges¹. Treatments include behavior programs, individualized education programs (IEPs), medication, sensory processing, assistive technology and diet².

In the documentation, mention... <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • If the patient is receiving therapy. • Getting a refill on medication. • The status of the condition.
